

Electricity bills and how they'd change

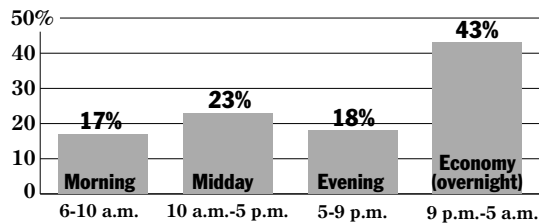
Puget Sound Energy took a residential customer's February electric bill and a business owner's March bill and converted them to the time-of-day rate schedule based on when each uses power throughout the day.

Residential customer

This customer, included in the new rate-change area, uses electricity for lights and appliances in a 2,050-square-foot house. No electricity goes to water or heat. The bill, calculated at the new time-of-day rates, would be just a few cents more.

Monthly bill at current winter rate:	\$32.70
Bill at new winter rate (based on current usage):	\$32.77
Percent change:	0.2%
Monthly bill at current summer rate:	\$32.70
Bill at new summer rate (based on current usage):	\$32.79
Percent change:	0.3%

Numbers may not add up to 100 due to rounding

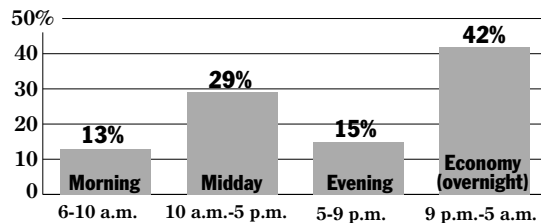

Restaurant owner

This commercial customer would be included in the new rate-change area. The customer's March bill, when calculated at the new time-of-day rates, would be about \$10 cheaper.

Monthly bill at current winter rate:	\$1,195.02
Bill at new winter rate (based on current usage):	\$1,184.69
Percent savings:	0.9%
Monthly bill at current summer rate:	\$1,101.57
Bill at new summer rate (based on current usage):	\$1,093.68
Percent savings:	0.7%
